IMPROVING ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

- Listening/Speaking Skills
- Analytical Skills in English

The language instruction program emphasizes improved understanding of spoken English and using oral English in informal social situations. Reading and writing skills are integrated into the program as a complement to the development of oral skills. Students are given community-based homework assignments which provide many opportunities to use English for daily life and to engage in conversations with American students and local residents.

Daily class activities use highly interactive and communicative methods to give students opportunities to develop both spoken fluency and increase their comprehension of the spoken language. The emphasis is on informal oral English in "real life" situations which students are likely to need in international encounters.

CULTURAL UNDERSTANDING, RESEARCH & PRESENTATION

- American values and institutions
 - Research skills
 - Presentation skills

Students learn about core American values and institutions, such as academic freedom, educational systems, and volunteer organizations. In addition, they practice academic research and writing skills, with special attention to sharpening critical thinking skills and avoiding plagiarism. Finally, students polish their English proficiency and public-speaking skills through speeches, small-group discussions and whole-group presentations.



Workshop Design

Monday - Friday, participants attend four daily sessions of 50 minutes each in the morning. Special presentations, field trips and community explorations take place in the afternoon.

FIELDWORK & INTERACTIVE ACTIVITIES

- Visit Hawaii's landmark sites
 - Interact with others in real world settings
 - Polish writing skills

Some assignments send participants to sites of historical and educational importance, where they must first interact with local residents by asking questions or conducting short interviews, and then write a paragraph on their experiences. Participants thus have the opportunity to engage in a real-world setting and to interact with other speakers of English, and get the chance for direct feedback on their own experiences and writing from their instructors.

Accommodations

Housing accommodations will be provided at the East-West Center Lincoln Hall for program participants at a special rate of \$33.00 per person per night on a double occupancy basis.* Single occupancy, if available, is \$66.00 per night.

Lincoln Hall provides hotel-style service. Rooms are furnished with refrigerator, color T.V., telephone, and private bath/shower. Clean towels are provided and rooms are cleaned daily. Please note that the rooms are furnished with one twin bed and one roll-away bed in case of double occupancy.

The East-West Center Residence Hall (Lincoln Hall) is located on the campus of the University of Hawaii at Manoa. The majority of residents are visiting scholars and short-term conference participants. A reception desk provides check-in and check-out services. The desk also takes messages, provides change for laundry and vending machines, issues spare keys, and provides general information.

**Please be advised that you will pay a single occupancy rate or may stay at the Hale Manoa Dormitory in the event that a roommate cannot be arranged.*

Application Procedures

Every applicant to the CAPE College Student Program should provide the following documents accordingly:

To receive an I-20 Form (for F-1 student visa)*

1. CAPE English Language Program Application Form (Form 1)
2. Signed Responsibility and Release Form (Form 4)
3. Deposit of \$1,743
(\$750 for tuition + \$100 non-refundable registration fee + \$858 for accommodations + \$35 for textbook)
4. Bank statement of availability of sufficient funds to cover your intended length of stay (minimum \$1,800 for 4 weeks) (The I-20 Form will be issued only for the length of time for which financial support is guaranteed.)
5. Financial statement (Form 2)
6. Statement of Financial Responsibility (if supported by parents or other sponsor - Form 3)

To receive an acceptance letter only (as visitor/tourist visa)**

1. CAPE English Language Program Application Form (Form 1)
2. Signed Responsibility and Release Form (Form 4)
3. Deposit of \$1,743
(\$750 for tuition + \$100 non-refundable registration fee + \$858 for accommodations + \$35 for textbook)

* *Full-time student - 20 hours a week (full-time study of 20 hours a week requires an F-1 student visa)*

** *Part-time student - less than 18 hours per week*

Medical Insurance

All students are required to have medical and emergency repatriation insurance to cover the period of time they will be in the United States. This insurance should be purchased before departure in the student's home country. All students will be required to show proof of such coverage before they begin classes in Hawaii.

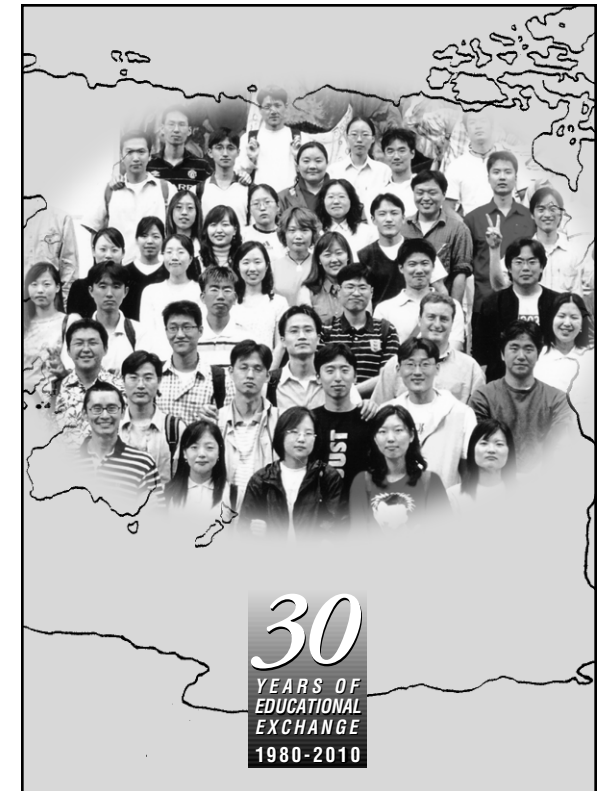
