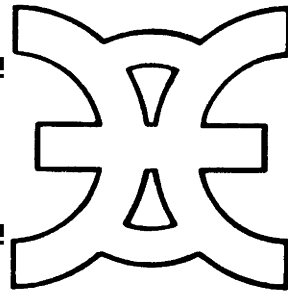

Japan, Afghanistan, Disaster Management

The focus of this year's annual spring CAPE "Asia Today" Series was on Japan, Afghanistan, and Disaster Management. The lectures, which ran on three consecutive Saturdays in April and May, were another success. Forum topics looked at the economic recovery implications for Japan, US AfPak strategy and its impact on the Pashtuns, as well as emergency response planning and disaster mental health.

Professor Byron Gangnes of UH's Economics Department discussed the origins of

the financial crisis and recession on April 24, 2010. He spoke on the challenges facing the global economy as it struggles to recover, and focused specifically on the experience of Japan and East Asia during the past two years and the opportunities and risks for the region going forward. His talk was followed by Dr. Lonny Carlile of UH's Asian Studies Department presenting on Hatoyama Yukio and the Democratic Party of Japan's (DPJ) Road to Power. As the DPJ is not particularly well

CAPE's annual fall Language & Culture Seminar will take place on three consecutive Saturdays in October and November, 2010. This year's focus is on Southeast Asia, the Silk Road, and Sri Lanka.

October 23rd speakers will include Dr. Miriam Stark of UH's Anthropology Department speaking on Lessons from Southeast Asia's Ancient Past (with primary focus on the history and period before western contact), and Dr. Michael Pietruszewsky, also of

UH's Anthropology Department, discussing The Physical Anthropology of Mainland Southeast Asia: biological relationships and trends in health associated with the intensification of agriculture in Northeast Thailand.

October 30th will feature the Silk Road, with Dr. Daniel W.Y. Kwok of UH's History Department presenting on The Silk Road: Grand Epochs and Global Significance, and Professor Kate Lingley of UH's Department of

known outside of Japan, Dr. Carlile gave insight on the origins of the party, the process that brought it to power, and its policies, as well as what we might expect from a DPJ government in the near term.

On May 1, 2010, Dr. Abdul-Karim Khan of UH's History Department gave us an overview of Afghanistan's History and Society as well as discussed the US AfPak Strategy and its Impact on the AfPak Pashtuns. He explained the impact of tribal and ethnic groups on the security and stability of Afghanistan, and showed how united by language, culture, religion, and history, Pashtuns make the single largest ethnic group in Central Asia, concluding

that unless the US/NATO forces win the minds and hearts of the Pashtuns, the AfPak strategy of the Obama Administration is in jeopardy.

On May 8, 2010, Dr. Kwok Fai Cheung of UH's Department of Ocean and Resources Engineering presented on the numerical modeling work of Storm-induced Coastal Inundation for Emergency Response Planning in support of the FEMA catastrophic hurricane readiness plan for Hawaii. His talk was followed by Officer Gregory T. Lefcourt of the Honolulu Police Department presenting a two-part session on Natural Hazard Mitigation. Officer Lefcourt shared stories

of the history of major tsunamis in Hawaii and focused on household, organizational, and community recovery from disasters as discussed in the context of mitigation activities to reduce vulnerability to disasters. Finally, Mr. Kenneth W.Y. Lee of the Hawaii State Disaster Mental Health's State Chapter of the American Red Cross provided participants with an understanding of what disaster mental health is and how the service is an essential part of any comprehensive, effective disaster response. All who attended learned and gained much from the sessions. CAPE compliments the speakers on their informative delivery and compelling lectures.

From Jan. 3 to 30, 2010, these teachers selected by the Kyunggi Province Institute for Foreign Language Education attended workshop lectures in the mornings and enjoyed ample time for fieldwork exploration around the island in the afternoons. They also had opportunities for local schools visits to observe American class-

rooms and meet with students and teachers, thus adding to their own professional development. As always, the success of their stay would not have been possible without the generous support provided by Principals Dwayne Priester of Mid Pacific Institute, Calvin Nomiya of Kalakaua Middle School, Gerald Teramae of Kalani High School, and Colleague Chair Lynn Aaberg of Waldorf School.
