Trade and Defense in the Asia-Pacific

The 31st “Asia Today” Series took place on May 6, 20, and 27, 2017, with talks focusing on trade and defense in the Asia-Pacific region, as well as the recent United States election and the Trump presidency. Without exception, those attending the Series found the lectures informative and timely, noting that the topics were on target for current world and American political and social realities.

On May 6, in a lecture titled “Reassessing the Cost and Benefits of Global Trade within an Era of ‘Mature’ Globalization,” Dr. Deane Neubauer delivered an examination of recent events, such as the U.S. government withdrawing from the Transpacific Trade Partnership, that are realigning the dynamics of the past three decades of globalization. One emergent prediction is that many global corporations may be “returning” in various ways to their national economies of origin. Dr. Neubauer’s presentation offered further examination of these events and explored some of their implications for the coming decade.

In the following two lectures on May 20 by Dr. Colin Moore, “American Social Policy in the Age of Trump” and “White Rage: Donald Trump and the Politics of Resentment” focused specifically on the new Trump Administration and the impact it may or may not have on American social policy and crucially asked why white, rural voters found Donald Trump’s campaign message so persuasive. Dr. Moore asked those attending his talks to consider the implications of Trump’s victory for the future of American democracy.

On the final day of the 31st “Asia Today” series, Dr. Neubauer returned to present a second lecture titled “Can the U.S. ‘Optimize’ a Defense Policy in the Asia-Pacific Region?” This lecture focused on the United States’ “reassessment” of its defense posture in the Asia-Pacific region. Dr. Denny Roy closed off the “Asia Today” series with his lecture “Regional Security Challenges in a New Era” which examined security in the Asia-Pacific region and presented a survey of some of the most urgent issues of this new, unsettled era.

One of them was a mortgage counselor who is a third-generation Japanese-American. He wondered why I came here and what I will do in the next three weeks. I told him I came here to study English more and experience foreign culture, then he gave me lots of helpful advice. First of all, he said if I want to experience foreign culture, I don't have to study because I already have a certain level of English proficiency. What I have to do is to go out and try to talk with local people. Even though you know how much it is, you have to ask the price or other information to the clerks. Even with a very small talk, he said I can learn something like

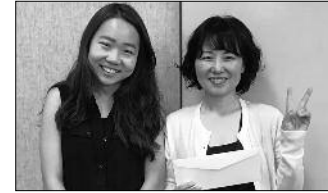

In Memory of Dr. Richard Schmidt



Dr. Richard Schmidt

I got acquainted with Dr. Richard Schmidt some time around 1978, when Dick joined the faculty of the then ESL Department at the University of Hawaii after years of teaching in other countries. At the time there was no Paradise Palms Cafeteria, thus many who worked in Moore Hall went to the cafeteria in Jefferson Hall. As a member of staff at the East-West Center, that's where I usually had lunch, too. Dick and I met there and

soon became friends. We talked often. During this time, I conceived the idea to create an educational institution to expedite cross-cultural and educational exchange among nations in the Asia-Pacific. In 1980, The Center for Asia-Pacific Exchange was formally incorporated in the State of Hawaii as an educational institution. Foremost in my mind was the American Studies Forum as the first inaugural program of the Center, followed by the Workshop for Teachers of English, aimed chiefly at teachers at the secondary school level to refine their English skills.

Dick gladly agreed to help develop the workshop for English teachers and he laid the foundations of the program. Dick served not only as the architect of our first program, but also participated in the workshop as a speaker. Quite a number of faculty in what is now the SLS department participated in the workshop, including Dr. Richard Day, Dr. Mark Lester, Dr. Ted Plaister, and Dr. Jack C. Richards. Now Dr. Day is the only faculty remaining who participated from the first workshop in 1982.

Noteworthy is that Dick served as faculty for 35 years and participated in over 129 workshops, never missing a single workshop. Dick, in other words, held the record for never missing a single workshop, making extraordinary efforts on our behalf. About 4 years ago, he was in Latin America during the summer when our workshops were scheduled to take place. He made a special trip to participate in our summer workshop. Always, Dick's lectures were full of enthusiasm, and were consistently evaluated by our participants as the most memorable and inspiring lectures they heard on methodology theory and practice.

Dr. Schmidt was professor of Second Language Studies at the University of Hawaii, where he taught from 1970-2012. He also served as Chair of the Department for six years, was Director of the National Foreign Language Resources Center at the University for 16 years, and was President of the American Association for Applied Linguistics (AAAL) in 2003-2004. He is the author of many journal articles and books in the areas of social and psychological factors in second and foreign language learning, as well as co-author of the Longman Dictionary of Language Teaching and Applied Linguistics (4th Edition, 2010). And of course, he served as a faculty of CAPE workshop for teachers of English for 35 years.

His devotion to the CAPE programs for so many years fills us with gratitude. He loved CAPE and its participants. We all cherish his devotion and contributions. Dr. Schmidt, rest in peace! You are near our hearts though you are gone. May you be blessed in heaven! We are grateful to you for all you left behind.
