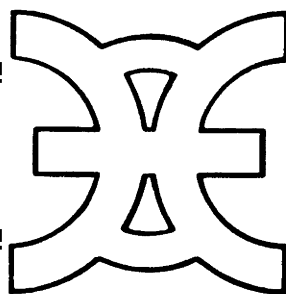

We thank all for their kindness as CAPE looks forward to another 30 years of quality programs in promoting educational exchange.

The 30th Annual American Studies Forum held from August 3-10, 2010, was another success. CAPE welcomed 12 professionals from Japan, Korea, the Philippines, and Singapore as they attended the forum on 20th Century American Literature: The Novel, Poetry, and Science Fiction." Featured speakers included Dr. Roger T. Ames, Professor of Philosophy with the Center for Chinese Studies at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; Dr. Jeffrey Carroll, Professor of English and Department Associate Director at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; Dr. James A. Dator, Professor and Director of the Hawaii Research Center for Futures Studies at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; Dr. Craig Howes, Editor of the journal *Biography: An Interdisciplinary Quarterly* and faculty member in the Department of English at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; Dr. John Rieder, Professor of English at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; Ms. Kimberly Schauman, Director of the grants program with the Hawaii Council for the Humanities and adjunct faculty at Chaminade University; and Dr. Susan M. Schultz, Professor of American literature, poetry and creative writing at the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

CAPE's most successful program, the

Workshops for Asian-Pacific Teachers of English included 217 participants from Japan, Korea, and the Philippines in 2010. These in-service teachers attended 10 different programs in Hawaii for skills training and professional development. For its 7th year of continuous sponsorship, the International Graduate School of English in Korea sent 26 of its graduate students over in the Winter and 22 graduate students in the Summer of 2010 for a two week and month-long study with CAPE respectively. Their workshops along with participants from Seoul, Kyunggi, and Chonnang Provinces, made up the English and Elementary teacher groups who attended the programs. CAPE owes many thanks to the expertise of well-known faculties from the University of Hawaii who contributed to the ongoing success of these workshops.

23 and 21 nurses and healthcare professionals from Korea also attended the 10th CAPE Workshop on Psychiatric/Mental Health from July 5 - 12, 2010, and the 15th CAPE Workshop for Clinical Nurse Specialists from November 3 - 13, 2010 respectively. Program sessions included lectures from healthcare professionals and nursing specialists in Hawaii, as well as opportunities of preceptorship training and shadowing at hospitals and health centers to learn about the issues and practices that currently impact the field. Afternoons and weekends were free for participants to explore many of Hawaii's beautiful attractions, such as Polynesian Cultural Center and Hanauma Bay.

2010 also included 11 different International Programs for College and College Nursing Students. These English language learning programs comprised both of regular and nursing college students from Korea and Japan. All came to study and

improve their English fluency skills. Students explore Hawaii and learn its culture and history through fieldwork activities and interaction with local residents. Presentation skills classes further aided their studies as part of CAPE's unique experience.

In addition, CAPE's 2 semi-annual Asia-Pacific Studies Forums featured the "Asia Today" series in Spring and the Language and Culture Seminar in Fall of 2010. These forums focus on the social, political, economic, and cultural issues that affect Asian countries today. The 24th Annual "Asia Today" Series looked at Japan, Afghanistan, and Disaster Management, while CAPE's 21st Language and Culture Seminar in the fall discussed Southeast Asia, the Silk Road, and Sri Lanka. More than 70 Honolulu community members attended the seminars, which always generate many interesting discussions.

CAPE would not be able to continue the offering of these quality programs without the generous support of our members and benefactors. 2010's generous donations allowed us to provide 62 grants and fellowships to CAPE participants from Japan, Korea, the Philippines, and the U.S. Congratulations to all recipients and a sincere Mahalo to the contributors!

standing and exchange. 2010's seminar featured topics on Southeast Asia, the Silk Road, and Sri Lanka. Workshops were held on 3 consecutive Saturday mornings at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. All lectures fueled many interesting discussions.

On October 23, 2010, Dr. Miriam Stark, Associate Professor of Anthropology at the University of Hawaii, presented on how archaeologists study the past, and the history of Southeast Asia as a subject of study, with primary focus on the period before western contact. She focused on three "hinge-points" in the development of Southeast Asia, from an archaeological point of view: 1) the origins of plant and animal domestication (or "origins of agriculture"); 2) the origins of metallurgy; and 3) the origins of states. This was followed by Dr. Michael Pietrusewsky, Professor of Anthropology at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, discussing the Physical Anthropology of Mainland Southeast Asia: biological relationships and trends in health associated with the intensification of agriculture in Northeast Thailand. He offered a brief overview of the biological relationships of the modern day inhabitants of mainland Southeast Asia and the surrounding regions, as well as studies of prehistoric skeletons from two archaeological sites in

Northeast Thailand, Ban Chiang and Non Nok Tha, to examine the biological consequences of the intensification of agriculture on human health in tropical Southeast Asia. These skeletal and dental data demonstrated that the patterns associated with the transition to agriculture in tropical Southeast Asia are heterogeneous and quite different from patterns observed elsewhere in the world.

On October 30, 2010, Dr. Daniel W.Y. Kwok, founding convener of the China Seminar, and professor emeritus of history at the University of Hawaii, discussed the global significance of the Silk Road as seen through three grand epochs: A) Era of the Pax Sinica and Pax Romana; B) Era of Sui-Tang China and Islam; C) Era of the Mongol Peace. He focused on the central theme of the role of Central Asia as cultural and political buffer and transmitter of peoples, ideas, languages, and art, and the implicit implications for the modern era. This was followed by Professor Kate Lingley of the Department of Art and Art History at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, presenting on Chinese Women and Silk Road Style in the Early Tang: A Case of Cultural Appropriation.

Finally, on November 6, 2010, Dr. Wimal Dissanayake of the Academy for

Creative Media at the University of Hawaii at Manoa and Director of the Cultural Studies Program at the East-West Center, examined the nature of Sri Lankan culture as it has evolved over the centuries, and the problems it faces as it seeks to create a new and modern society. Following this, Dr. Dissanayake further discussed certain Buddhist films in Sri Lanka in comparison with certain Korean films such as Im Kwon-taek's "Mandala", Bae Yong-kyun's "Why Did Bodhidharma Leave for the East", and Kim Ki-duk's "Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter... and Spring". He argued that Korea has made some of the finest Buddhist films, and so presents a yardstick with which to measure Buddhist films from other countries.

The three day series was a success and brought on greater awareness of today's cultural issues for all participants. CAPE thanks the community members who attended, as well as the seminar faculties for their time and presentations. It is with their dedication and support that CAPE continues to offer these lectures free to the public. ## The 30th Annual American Studies Forum

**2010's** landmark 30th Annual American Studies Forum held from August 3 - 10 featured 20th Century American Literature: The Novel, Poetry, and Science Fiction. Forum topics included "American Pragmatism and Confucianism: A Dialog Between Culture" by Dr. Roger T. Ames; "Landmark American Novels of the 1920s" and "William Faulkner and His Novels" by Dr. Jeffrey Carroll; "Alternative Visions of America's Future" by Dr. James A. Dator; "Hawaii Literature & American Literature: Points of Contact and the Gaps Between" by Dr. Craig Howes; "Twentieth Century American Science Fiction" by Dr. John Rieder; "The American National Memorial Landscape: Conflicts, Controversies, and the American Self" by Ms. Kimberly Schauman; and "American Documentary Poetry" by Dr. Susan M. Schultz. 12 scholars from Japan, Korea, the Philippines, and Singapore attended this week-long forum.

Revisiting the traditions of American philosophy, Prof. Ames of the Center for Chinese Studies at the University of Hawaii-Manoa, has found productive resonances that can provide us with a language in which we can appeal to in introducing Confucian philosophy to the Western academy. Given the often delicate and sometimes underproductive history of the relationship between America and China, Dr. Ames argued that American pragmatism might serve as a vocabulary to promote a positive dialogue between these cultures at a moment in history when such a conversation is imperative.

The 1920s is perhaps the richest of all in producing lasting, universally praised novels of the American Experience. Dr. Jeffrey Carroll, Associate Director and Professor of English at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, examined four of these novels by perhaps four of our greatest novelists of the period: Ernest

Hemingway's *The Sun Also Rises* (1926), F. Scott Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby* (1925), Willa Cather's *The Professor's House* (1925), and William Faulkner's *The Sound and the Fury* (1929). He discussed how this period and its novels are instrumental in understanding American culture, values, and place in the world. Dr. Carroll then further reviewed the major works of William Faulkner, a poet and novelist, idolized abroad but little known at home for such classic novels as *The Sound and the Fury*, *As I Lay Dying*, *Light in August*, *The Hamlet*, and *Intruder in the Dust*. The achievements of William Faulkner in subject, style and structure revolutionized the art of the novel.

In addition, Dr. James A. Dator, Professor and Director of the Hawaii Research Center for Futures Studies at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, provided *Alternative Visions of America's Future*. Throughout history, American citizens have agreed upon the basic purpose and direction of their society. The goal was to modernize, industrialize, develop and progress. Until recently, Americans have shared this sense of social purpose. Now, however, that sense is shattered, and a number of alternative visions of America's future are jostling for primacy. In this workshop, Dr. Dator considered the reasons for the loss of single-purpose; the bases of the alternatives; and certain aspects of the emerging discipline of future studies which tries, among other things, to assess the likelihood and consequences of America's alternative futures.

Dr. Craig Howes, Editor of the journal *Biography: An Interdisciplinary Quarterly* and faculty with the Department of English at the University of Hawaii, also presented on *Hawaii & American Literature*. With a distinct history Hawaiian literature was deeply affected by the introduction from America of literacy education, and then by successive waves of Asian settler and Amero-European settler immigration. The result is a remarkably diverse range in multiple languages, and from very different

cultural perspectives. Dr. Howes focused on examples from the past hundred years to discuss the question of how successfully or usefully the term "American Literature" applies to the writings of Hawaii.

Dr. John Rieder, Professor with the English Department at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, presented a survey of the history of American science fiction in twentieth century print and film media, emphasizing the wide variety of its forms, the vicissitudes of its reception history, and the emergence of science fiction studies as an academic field in the last decades of the twentieth century. Ms. Kimberly Schauman, Director of the grants program of the Hawaii Council for the Humanities and adjunct faculty at Chaminade University, also traced the history of the American national memorial landscape, with a specific focus on the relationship between conflicts in United States history and controversial monuments.

Finally, Dr. Susan M. Schultz, Professor with the Department of English at UH-Manoa, looked at several instances of Documentary poetry from the 20th and 21st centuries, as they offer strengths from several genres, including historical and critical writing, journalism, detective work, letter writing and poetry, and are thus well suited for looking at intersections of the personal and political. Among texts used were William Carlos Williams' *Paterson* (Book 1), Muriel Rukeyser's *The Book of the Dead*, Mark Nowak's *Shut Up Shut Down*, Eleni Sikelianos's *The Book of Jon*, Susan M. Schultz's *Dementia Blog*, and Kaia Sand's *Remember to Wave* (forthcoming).

All participants gained much from these workshops and greatly enjoyed their time in Hawaii. CAPE would like to thank the faculty and speakers for their contribution in making this forum a success!

From July 25 - August 18, 2010, 22 teachers from the International Graduate School of English attended CAPE's 70th Workshop for Asian-Pacific Teachers of English. Participants also took part in teacher training courses and visits to Hawaii public schools.

Workshop courses offered teaching techniques for practical classroom applica-

tions as well as other important issues such as Teaching Vocabulary Skills, Fluency and Appropriacy in Oral English, Telling Stories: Accounts of Personal Experience and Other Forms of Extended Discourse, Survey of Games for Motivation in Teaching English, Second Language Pedagogies: Integrating Technologies into Language & Research, Testing & Evaluation, Motivating Foreign Language Learners, Bridging Psychology of Learning with Pedagogy, Developing Interaction Competence for EFL Learners, Teaching English as an International Language: The Role of Culture in Asian Context, Communication Activities for EFL Learners, and Making Sense of Language Teaching Methodologies.

## IN MEMORIAM

One of CAPE's staunchest supporters, Dr. Rosie Kim Chang, died peacefully in her sleep on February 1, 2011; she was 92 years old. The first nurse from Hawaii to receive a Master's Degree in nursing when she graduated from the University of Pittsburgh, later in life she also earned a Doctorate in public health. At Queen's Hospital (now the Queen's Medical Center), where she earned her initial nursing degree, she was a head nurse, a clinical instructor, a general nursing supervisor, the Assistant Director of the Queen's Hospital School of Nursing, and later the Director of Nursing. During her illustrious career, Rosie undertook to improve mental health care and conditions at the Hawaii State Hospital, and was instrumental in winning the hospital's first accreditation. She was Associate Director of the Regional Medical Program, a federal program that evaluated and supported community health initiatives in the Pacific. Finally, she was one of the founders of the Hawaii League for Nursing, and served multiple terms as president of the League, as well as the Hawaii Nurses Association. Other public service included time on the City and County of Honolulu Ethics Commission, the Liquor Commission, the Hawaii Health Advisory Committee, and the



Hawaii Commission on the Status of Women.

All of these professional and public commitments did not prevent Rosie from being a warm and supportive friend. Active in many Chinese- and Korean-American social clubs, she was also instrumental in establishing CAPE's extensive network of contacts with health care facilities in Honolulu, and she introduced us to many key people who helped us develop our nursing and health programs. Her efforts helped us bring together thousands of nursing students, nursing administrators, nursing educators, and nursing leaders from Asia. Her support did not end there; she also opened her home and heart to countless CAPE students and professionals. She and her husband, Dr. John Chang, hosted our CAPE participants at many dinners and parties, and even helped us in furnishing the CAPE home. We at CAPE are filled with gratitude at all the help we have received from Rosie Chang over the years.

She is survived by her son John Chang (Maylani), grandchildren Jennifer Chang and John Stephen Chang (Hee-Jin), along with sister Clara K. Amundsen and brother Earl Kim.
